Manager's Investment Report

Investment Objective and Policy

The objective of the Fund is to deliver both an income return and capital growth.

The Manager will aim to identify a combination of investments that allow the payment of a regular income, while maintaining a focus on capital preservation.

The Fund invests in a broad range of UK and overseas companies' shares, fixed interest securities, cash and other assets including those giving indirect exposure to commodities and property. The Fund will have a bias towards fixed interest securities and up to 35% of the Fund's property will have an exposure to shares.

Exposure to these asset classes will be achieved usually through investment in collective investment schemes but may also be achieved by investing directly in shares, fixed interest securities, cash, near cash, deposits and money market instruments.

At times the Fund may be fully invested in collective investment schemes only or direct investments only. The collective investment schemes invested in include Index-tracking or actively-managed funds managed by Legal & General.

The Fund will use derivatives for efficient portfolio management purposes only.

Manager's Investment Report

During the year under review, the price of the Fund's I-Class accumulation units fell by 2.06%. The Fund under-performed its peer group as funds within the Investment Association Mixed Investment 0-35% Sector delivered a mean (average) return of -1.84% (Source: Lipper Hindsight).

Market/Economic Review

The global economic background has broadly improved over the past twelve months, driven increasingly by the strength of domestic demand in the major economies. Despite a rise in commodity prices, with the oil price (Brent crude) recovering to over \$82 per barrel in September, its highest level since 2014, inflationary pressures worldwide have remained subdued by historical standards.

In the US, economic activity remained in reasonable shape, underpinned by improving consumer and business sentiment, as the impact of tax cuts and a strong labour market have boosted domestic demand. US economic growth accelerated during the second quarter of 2018 to its fastest rate of growth in almost four years. The Federal Reserve (Fed) sanctioned a gradual tightening of monetary policy, raising interest rates four times over the last twelve months. The Fed also began unwinding its asset purchase programme, known as quantitative easing (QE), last October. In December, Congress approved the Trump administration's tax reforms which include a cut in the main rate of corporation tax from 35% to 21%.

The Eurozone economy grew at its fastest pace for a decade in 2017 although there was some loss of momentum during the first half of 2018 with a slowdown in Germany and France, the region's two largest economies. The European Central Bank (ECB) announced it would cease its monthly asset purchase programme by the end of 2018. With inflation remaining subdued the ECB has signalled interest rates are likely to remain on hold at least until mid-2019.

Manager's Investment Report continued

In the UK, both economic and political uncertainty heightened over the last 12 months, with precariousness as to the outcome of Brexit negotiations and the implications for trade with the EU. The UK economy grew at its slowest pace for six years during the first quarter of 2018, although growth recovered somewhat during the second quarter. The Bank of England voted to increase interest rates to 0.5% in November, removing the emergency support announced in August 2016 in the wake of the EU referendum, and sanctioned a further rate hike to 0.75% in August as inflation remained above its 2% target.

Looking at the Asian economies, Japan recorded eight consecutive quarters of growth as monetary policy has remained loose, although the economy contracted during the first quarter of 2018, before subsequently rebounding in the second quarter. The Chinese authorities have adopted a range of policy initiatives to facilitate the economy's transition from export and investment-driven growth towards consumption and services, while tightening regulation of shadow banking and encouraging debt reduction in the broader economy. Recent Chinese economic indicators suggest year-on-year growth remains in line with the government's 6.5% target.

Amongst other emerging economies, Brazil saw a turn in fortunes after a two-year recession ended in 2017 while the Russian economy has expanded for eight consecutive quarters, given the boost of a recovery in commodity markets.

More recently, October saw a market correction for equities which severely impacted 2018's performance to date, although was not of the same order of magnitude as a similar event in February. Credit spreads widened modestly, and yields for developed-market bonds jumped higher. Emerging market debt assets, particularly local currency denominated debt, has suffered over 2018 to date.

Fund Review

The Fund saw a negative return over the review year. The Fund's holdings in emerging market debt contributed negatively to performance, as did equities, which sold off during October. Between a market correction in February and October's sell-off, risk assets, particularly US equities, had performed well against the backdrop of a strengthening global economy and US tax cuts, although Trump's on-going trade adventurism with China and Germany gave cause for concern. In Europe, political populism was a concern as Italy's government prepared to loosen its fiscal belt.

Towards the end of the review year, our outlook for UK government bonds improved as the Bank of England increased the base rate, rhetoric around Brexit negotiations became less negative and gilt yields rose. We reduced our European utilities position after strong performance, and topped up our European equities allocation.

Outlook

We have seen a correction that should be large enough to make US equities look less expensive than other equity markets. Overall, equity markets do not look expensive especially when compared to other asset classes such as government bonds. Secondly, the global economy looks to be in good shape with a combination of solid growth, low recession risk and transparent central banks: a generally supportive environment for equities.

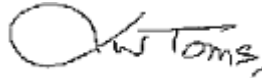

Statement of the Manager's Responsibilities

Independent auditor's report to the Unitholders of Legal & General Mixed Investment Income 0-35% Fund ('the Fund')

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of the Fund for the year ended 30 October 2018 which comprise the Statement of Total Return, the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Unitholders, the Balance Sheet, the Related Notes and Distribution Tables for the Fund and the accounting policies set out on pages 14 and 15.

In our opinion, the financial statements:

- give a true and fair view, in accordance with UK accounting standards, including FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, of the financial position of the Fund as at 30 October 2018 and of the net revenue and the net capital losses on the property of the Fund for the year then ended; and

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements have been prepared in compliance with UK Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102) and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for UK Authorised Funds issued by the Investment Management Association in May 2014 (2014 SORP).

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of Preparation

The Financial Statements have been prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities measured at fair value through profit or loss.

The principal accounting policies which have been applied consistently are set out below.

(b) Functional and Presentation Currency

The functional and presentation currency of the Fund is Sterling.

(c) Recognition of Revenue

Bond revenue is accounted for on an effective yield basis, calculated with reference to the purchase price. If the Manager believes that future commitments will not be met due to the bond issuer showing signs of financial distress, revenue accruals will be discounted. Any resultant revenue from these issues will then be treated on a receipts basis.

Revenue from distribution and accumulation units in Collective Investment Schemes is recognised when the distribution is quoted ex-dividend.

Equalisation on distributions received from Collective Investment Schemes is treated as capital property of the Fund.

Rebates received from underlying Collective Investment Schemes are treated as revenue or capital depending on the treatment of the Manager's fees in the underlying Fund.

Revenue from offshore funds is recognised when it is reported.

Revenue from derivative instruments is treated in accordance with note 2(i).

All other revenue is recognised on an accruals basis.

(d) Treatment of Expenses

All expenses (other than those relating to the purchase and sale of investments) are charged against revenue on an accruals basis.

Notes to the Financial Statements continued

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(e) Distribution Policy

The policy is to distribute all available revenue, after deduction of those expenses which are chargeable in calculating the distribution. In order to conduct a controlled dividend flow, interim distributions will be at the Manager's discretion, up to a maximum of the distributable revenue for the year. All remaining revenue is distributed in accordance with the COLL. In addition, the equalisation received from underlying Collective Investment Schemes forms part of the distribution for the Fund. This will have the effect of increasing the distribution yield for this Fund but may constrain capital growth.

Fund management fees are deducted from capital for the purpose of calculating the distribution.

Distributions which have remained unclaimed by Unitholders for over six years are credited to the capital property of the Fund.

(f) Basis of Valuation of Investments

All investments are valued at their fair value as at 3pm on 30 October 2018, being the last working day of the accounting year. The fair value for non-derivative securities is bid market price, excluding any accrued interest. The fair value for units in Collective Investment Schemes is the cancellation price or bid price for dual priced funds and single price for single priced funds. The fair value for derivative instruments is the cost of closing out the contract on the last working day of the accounting year.

Where values cannot be readily determined, the securities are valued at the Manager's best assessment of their fair and reasonable value.

(g) Taxation

Provision is made for taxation at current rates on the excess of investment revenue over expenses.

Deferred tax is provided for on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed by the balance sheet date, other than those differences that are regarded as permanent. Any liability to deferred tax is provided for at the average rate of tax expected to apply.

(h) Foreign Exchange

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling on the date of the transaction. Where applicable, assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at 3pm on 30 October 2018, being the last working day of the accounting year.

Notes to the Financial Statements continued

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies continued

(i) Derivative Instruments

The Fund may make use of financial derivative instruments for Efficient Portfolio Management (EPM) purposes. EPM aims to reduce risk, reduce costs, or generate additional capital or income for the Fund with an acceptably low level of risk. These aims allow for tactical asset allocation, which is a temporary switch in investment exposure through the use of derivatives rather than trading the underlying securities.

Derivative instruments held within the Fund have been accounted for and taxed in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for Authorised Funds (IA SORP 2014). Returns on derivative transactions have been treated as either revenue or capital depending on the motives and circumstances on acquisition.

12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks

The investments of a Fund in financial securities and derivatives are subject to normal market fluctuations and other risks inherent in investing in such instruments. Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited (UTM) is the Authorised Fund Manager and has responsibility for ensuring appropriate risk management processes are implemented for each Unit Trust.

The UTM Board has delegated the risk oversight function to the Fund Manager Oversight Committee (FMOC), a committee of the Legal & General Investment Management (Holdings) Limited (LGIMH) Board that meets monthly. The primary objective of the FMOC is to ensure proper oversight of the investment management activities and associated services performed by LGIM, its delegates and other Fund Managers, under the Investment Management Agreement (IMA), on behalf of UTM in its capacity as Authorised Fund Manager. The committee consists of senior members of LGIMH and members of the UTM Board. Other senior staff members are also in attendance, as required by the agenda.

Each Fund has Investment Guidelines, an Investment Objective and Investment Restrictions, against which the fund manager will operate. These are set out in Schedule 1 of the IMA between LGIM and UTM. The Schedule is maintained by each fund manager, reviewed by the LGIM Operational Risk and Compliance Teams and approved senior members of LGIMH on behalf of the UTM board. The Schedule provides the detail needed to determine the risk profile for each fund. Fund managers are not permitted to invest into any new instruments without first gaining approval from UTM.

The Investment Objective and Policy of this Fund is detailed on page 2.

(a) Market Risk arising from other price risk

Market Risk arises mainly from uncertainty about future prices. It represents the potential loss the Fund may suffer through holding market positions in the face of market movements.

Other price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices (other than those arising from interest rate risk or currency risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual financial instrument or its issuer, or factors affecting similar instruments traded in the market.

The assets held by the Fund can be seen in the Portfolio Statement starting on page 8. Movements in the prices of these investments result in movements in the performance of the Fund. The Manager adheres to the investment guidelines established in the Trust Deed, the Prospectus, the COLL and the Fund's IOG, and in this way, monitors and controls the exposure to risk from any type of security, sector or issuer.

At 30 October 2018, if the price of the investments held by the Fund increased or decreased by 5%, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £2,939,013 (30 October 2017: £1,647,088).

12. Financial Instruments and Associated Risks continued

(b) Interest Rate Risk

Interest Rate Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in interest rates.

The Fund is exposed to interest rate risk through its holdings in debt securities and underlying collective investment schemes that pay interest distributions.

The market value of debt securities and any floating rate payments from debt securities held (and interest rate swaps) may fluctuate as a result of changes in interest rates. This risk is managed by the active monitoring and adjustment of the investments held directly by this Fund and within each underlying Fund that invests in debt securities, in line with the stated investment objective and policy of the Fund.

At 30 October 2018, if interest rates on the Fund increased or decreased by 1 basis point, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £27,871. This represents the Manager's best estimate of a reasonable possible shift in interest rates, having regard to historical volatility of those rates.

(c) Foreign Currency Risk

Foreign Currency Risk is the risk of movements in the value of financial instruments as a result of fluctuations in exchange rates. This risk may be managed by the use of forward currency contracts or currency futures as necessary.

As this Fund invests in other collective investment schemes that hold investment instruments in overseas financial securities, there is currency risk in respect of the financial instruments held by those schemes.

Forward currency contracts and/or currency futures were utilised during the current and preceding year.

At 30 October 2018, if the value of Sterling increased or decreased by 1% against all currencies, with all other variables remaining constant, then the net assets attributable to unitholders would increase or decrease by approximately £89,831 (30 October 2017: £40,208).

(d) Credit Risk

Credit Risk is the risk of suffering financial loss as a result of a counterparty to a financial transaction being unable to fulfil their financial obligations as they fall due.

Bonds or other debt securities involve credit risk to the issuer which may be evidenced by the issuer's credit rating. Securities which are subordinated and/or have a lower credit rating are generally considered to have a higher credit risk and a greater possibility of default than more highly rated securities.

The Fund's investments in bonds expose it to the default risk of the bond issuer with regards interest payments and principal repayments. At the balance sheet date none of the bonds held by the Fund's had low credit ratings (sub-investment grade).

As this Fund invests in Collective Investment Schemes, there is credit risk in respect of the assets held by these Schemes.

This risk is managed by appraising the credit profile of financial instruments and issuers in line with the Fund's investment objective and policy.

(e) Liquidity Risk

Liquidity Risk relates to the capacity to meet liabilities as they fall due. The primary source of this risk to the Fund is the liability to Unitholders for any cancellation of units.

The Fund can also be exposed to liquidity risk through its commitments under derivative contracts, whereby additional margin payments or collateral payments may need to be posted with the counterparty or clearing house.

This risk is minimised by holding a large proportion of readily realisable assets, cash balances and via access to overdraft facilities.

(f) Derivative Risk - Sensitivity Analysis

Derivative Risk arises from uncertainty about future market movements. This risk is managed by the policies shown within Market risk.

At the balance sheet date the Fund made use of the following derivatives:

Futures (excluding Currency Futures)

Futures are used to adjust the duration and interest rate risk of the Fund, and to adjust the equities exposure of the Fund, in a cost effective manner. The effect of these instruments was to increase the exposure of the Fund by £909,923 (30 October 2017: £2,010,283), representing 1.49% of the net asset value (30 October 2017: 5.78%).

This results in an effective market exposure at the year end of 98.04% (30 October 2017: 100.46%) of net assets, which means that the gains or losses of the Fund will be 0.9804 (30 October 2017: 1.0046) times the gains or losses if the Fund was fully invested in equities.

(g) Fair Value

The fair value of a financial instrument is the amount for which it could be exchanged between knowledgeable, willing parties in an arm's length transaction. There is no material difference between the value of the financial assets and liabilities, as shown in the financial statements, and their fair value.

Legal & General (Unit Trust Managers) Limited acts as the principal on all the transactions of the units in the Fund. The aggregated monies received through creations or paid on cancellations are disclosed in the statement of change in net assets attributable to unitholders.

Equalisation amounts relating to creations and cancellations of units are shown within note 7. Fees received by the Authorised Fund Manager from the Fund plus any rebates paid by the Authorised Fund Manager to the Fund are shown within notes 3, 4 and 5 as applicable. Any outstanding fees, amounts outstanding on creations or cancellations of units in the Fund, or rebates receivable by the Fund from the Manager are shown within notes 8 and 10 as applicable.

The Comparative Tables on pages 42 to 50 give the performance of each active share class in the Fund.

The 'Return after charges' disclosed in the Comparative Tables is calculated as the return after operating charges per unit divided by the opening net asset value per unit. It differs from the Fund's performance disclosed in the Manager's report, which is calculated based on the latest published price.

Portfolio transaction costs are incurred when investments are bought or sold by a fund in order to achieve the investment objective. These transaction costs affect an investor in different ways depending on whether they are joining, leaving or continuing with their investment in the Fund.

Direct transaction costs include broker commission and taxes. Broker commission includes the fee paid to a broker to execute the trades and research costs.

In addition, there are indirect portfolio transaction costs arising from the 'dealing spread' – the difference between the buying and selling prices of underlying investments in the portfolio. Unlike shares whereby broker commissions and stamp duty are paid by a fund on each transaction, other types of investments (such as bonds, money instruments, derivatives, collective investment schemes) do not have separately identifiable transaction costs; these costs form part of the dealing spread. Dealing spreads vary considerably depending on the transaction value and money market sentiment.

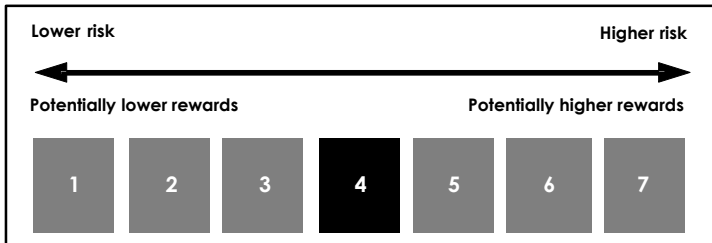
